impressed us with how much technical knowledge they already had, and have started following some A-Level schemes of work already!






The National Photography & Video Show

Celebrating Creative Excellence: Y7 AIM High Poetry Workshop

On Fri 2nd Feb, Arden hosted an AIM High day with local poet, Emilie Lauren Jones. Year 7 students Daisy Keep, Sophie Richmond, Catherine R, Amelia Morris, Harley Wood, and Henry Javelleau-Hill, were chosen for their enthusiasm for creative writing. Throughout the day, they collaborated with peers from neighbouring schools, delving into diverse poetry styles and crafting their own poems.

One standout moment of the day was when Catherine R's poem was selected for publication in Brian Moses' prestigious poetry blog. The blog has had over 660,000 visits in the past 10 years and averages 100 visits per day in term time. Emilie Lauren Jones, the facilitator of the workshop, shared her insights into why Catherine's work stood out amongst the rest:

This piece came about through our ekphrastic poetry activity where students' poems were inspired by pieces of art. Catherine continued writing and editing her poem over lunch time and this is the result. I loved the different phases of the poem as well as her use of repetition. The imagery is powerful and I related to the theme of finding hopefulness among the anxiety. I thought the way she described life as 'messy' worked really well and gave the poem a uniqueness.

Science Fair

The Arden Science Fair took place on Friday 15th March, there were over 20 entries from students with over 60 students involved in total (from all key stages). The students showcased their scientific models, investigations, creations and research, presenting projects

to their parents and teachers. The student entries included the winner for Key Stage 5 which was a Cloud Chamber produced by Carrick Hayre, James Dowson and Gabriel Avery. The three went on to showcase a dry ice extravaganza with the help of Miss Campbell. The winning entry from Key Stage Four was from Billy Massey who gave a detailed presentation on the differences between different species of Rat Snake. His own pet rat snake Jackson stole the show. Finally, the

winners for Key stage 3 were Shaan Bhopal and Ben Fowler who designed their own working miniature toilet to test how flushable wipes advertised as 'flushable' really are. Noah Henebury and Oliver Pirie were close runners up after designing their own robot and investigating whether it could lift its own body weight. All students involved put in so much effort and we were so proud to see them present their projects with such passion.

Ambassador School for English Literature

We are an Ambassador school for OCR A Level English Literature. As a result of this status, we have already been sent 300 free books to use with our A Level classes – and some of our younger pupils – to promote reading engagement and to diversify the curriculum.

Also, as part of our Ambassador status, we have been fortunate enough to be selected as a partner school by the publishers Vintage. Vintage want to work with us to promote careers in writing and publishing as well as supporting our pupils as readers. They have already sent us a selection of 'proof' copies of new texts for our Year 12 students to read and then provide feedback. Despite our record of impressive exam results, both for A Level Literature and for the combined Language and Literature course, we are seeing a decline in pupils taken English A Levels and an even more marked decline in those going on to study English at University. We hope that our partnership with Vintage will enable more pupils to see careers in the Arts and creative industries as viable, attractive and important options.

Last month, Mr Lenton and I had the privilege of being invited to the Vintage annual party which was held in London. We were introduced to the managing director of Vintage who, in her keynote speech, explained how as a consequence of the partnership with Arden, they will be donating 350 free books to our school – one for



every guest at the party. These books, as part of the 'Lit in Colour' programme, will be used to enhance and diversify our Year 9 curriculum and we are very excited to be able to share these books with our pupils. All attendees at the party – which included Neneh Cherry, BBC journalist Rory Cellan-Jones, Afua Hirsch, Howard Jacobson, Nazanin Zaghari-Radcliffe and Nigella Lawson – received a postcard, which you can see here, explaining the partnership between Vintage and Arden.



We are very excited to be working with Vintage and look forward to the interesting and enriching opportunities we know this partnership will bring.

Revision trip

Year 13 students embarked on a trip to the Tutor2u conference, where they delved into A level workshops in preparation for their upcoming Business and Psychology exams. This insightful day proved instrumental in solidifying classroom knowledge and honing exam techniques. Led by experienced examiners, the workshops offered invaluable advice on optimising exam performance and addressed common pitfalls encountered by students nationally. The event was met with great enthusiasm by the 20 attendees, who appreciated the learning opportunity it provided.

University insight

Dr Wendy Tabrizi from Aston University Business School came to speak to

Year 12 students about the university and the marketing course in particular. She spoke about future careers

in marketing, including how some students had gone on from placement years within their degree to work for the company that they were on placement with. The students were able to ask a range of question around the university and the course, giving them an idea of the expectations of university academic life.

The students said "It was really insightful to gain more of an idea as to what a Marketing degree involves", with another saying "It was nice to be able to ask someone questions from a university, and have them answer them on a more personal basis".



Arden Students Triumph at Worcestershire Poetry Slam with Poignant Piece on Refuge and Friendship

Arden's Year 7 students Harlow Grant, Maksym Drachevskyi, Abi Reeves, and Zara Kaval were chosen to compete at the prestigious Worcestershire Poetry Slam, alongside Year 8 student Daniel Shooter who was initially codirecting alongside Miss O'Brien however, a last-minute dropout saw Daniel stepping in to lend his talents.

The performance unfolded with Daniel taking on the role of narrator. He set the scene for a poignant tale of a young boy, portrayed by Maksym, fleeing his war-torn homeland of Ukraine to seek solace in a new life in the UK. Upon arrival at his new school, he encounters Harlow, who is grappling with the harsh realities of bullying.



As the story progressed, the antagonists (Abi Reeves and Zara Kaval) turned their attention towards



Maksym, offering Harlow a choice between being liked or being kind. After a persuasive poetic monologue from Maksym, Harlow chose friendship. United, they stood up to the bullies, who also chose friendship over unkindness.

Their performance delivered a powerful message of empathy and compassion. Competing against thirteen other schools and facing scrutiny from four poet judges, Arden's performance earned them a well-deserved third place.



The success of the performance was a testament to the students' hard work and dedication. In the end, Arden's students proved themselves not only as talented performers but also as advocates for unity and compassion whose message was clear: "Refuge: Celebrate Friendship. No Borders."
